But the journey didn't end there. We thought bigger and continued onward. We set an ambitious goal: Raise an additional \$1 billion, across all of OHSU's missions, by Dec. 31, 2020. This was the ONWARD campaign.

Thanks to you, we have met that goal, and your support has expanded the frontiers of human health. You have brought unprecedented generosity and hope. "Human health, equitable access to health care, education and medical research have never been more important to our communities than they are right now," says OHSU President Danny Jacobs, MD, MPH, FACS. Thanks to more than 50,000 donors like you, lives have been changed for the better. A family from rural Oregon has a place to stay while their child receives specialized cancer treatment, thanks to donors who contributed

How to Be Generous at Every Age

Generosity takes on new meaning as we grow older, build financial resources and set charitable goals. These planning checkpoints, arranged by age group, outline how to maximize your generosity to the causes that matter the most to you.

50s

Update your will to reflect any life changes, such as beginning a new relationship or grown children leaving home. Meet with a financial advisor to review your investments and savings — there's still time to make catch-up contributions for retirement.

Best Ways to Be Generous

- A gift in your will or trust: This costs you nothing today and can be made by adding one sentence to this document.
- Retirement plan assets: Name OHSU Foundation and/or Doernbecher Children's Hospital as a beneficiary of part or all of your retirement plan assets. It takes minutes to contact your plan administrator or complete the change-of-beneficiary form online.
- Appreciated securities: Donate stocks you've owned for longer than one year and receive an income tax charitable deduction when you itemize. You can also eliminate capital gains taxes.

60s

Check with your financial advisor to make sure you are on track with retirement savings. If you've already retired, revisit your expenses, priorities and health care needs.

Best Ways to Be Generous

- Life income gifts: If you are looking for income in retirement, consider establishing a charitable remainder trust and use appreciated assets to maximize your tax benefits. You receive income for life from the trust, with the rest supporting OHSU and/or Doernbecher Children's Hospital after your lifetime. If you have a high net worth and are looking to minimize taxes, a charitable lead trust allows you to support OHSU and/or Doernbecher now and provide for loved ones in the future.
- Beneficiary designations: Review the beneficiaries of your life insurance policies and retirement plan assets. Many of these assets may result in a large tax hit for your family, but they pass tax-free to us.
- Bank or brokerage accounts: Most states* allow you to designate one or more individuals or charities as a beneficiary of a checking or savings account; certificates of deposit; or brokerage or investment accounts.
- * State laws govern payable-on-death accounts and transfer-on-death accounts. Please consult with your bank representative or investment advisor if you are considering these gifts.

Best Ways to Be Generous

- Gift from your IRA: If you are 70½ or older, give any amount up to \$100,000 per year from your IRA directly to a qualified nonprofit such as OHSU Foundation and/or Doernbecher's Children's Hospital without having to pay income taxes on the money.
- Legacy letter: This optional companion piece to your estate plan is a chance to share your dreams and your story with your loved ones.

BACK IN 2021

After being suspended in 2020 as part of the CARES Act, the required minimum distribution (RMD) is back in 2021 for those 72 and older. If you don't need your distribution for daily expenses, consider using it to make a tax-free gift to OHSU Foundation and/or Doernbecher's Children's Hospital. Contact us to learn more.

700 scientists and staff members as new recruits join the Knight Cancer Institute.

Patients struggling to retain their eyesight can turn to the Oregon Elks Children's Eye Clinic at the Casey Eye Institute. The new clinic expanded the original pediatric clinic's space by nearly one-third. The facility also provides state-of-the-art eye care for issues ranging from macular degeneration to inherited conditions that can cause blindness.

When a child's life is turned upside down by a devastating illness or injury, OHSU Doernbecher Children's Hospital is there with patient-centered care and access to new therapies not available anywhere else in the community. The hospital has developed innovative programs such as NICH, or Novel Interventions in Child Healthcare, to improve outcomes for children, and their families, whose medical needs are compounded by social, personal or financial challenges.

A Groundswell of Giving

"This is a testament to the generosity of our philanthropic supporters joining together to make a difference across our state," says Matt McNair, OHSU Foundation president.

Nearly 80% of campaign gifts came from donors in Oregon and southwest Washington, and more than half of those who contributed to ONWARD are first-time OHSU donors.

Moreover, the OHSU endowment grew by 115% throughout the campaign. This allowed the university to establish 213 new endowed funds, including 11 new endowed chairs and 34 new endowed professorships, helping to recruit and retain the best and brightest.

"Gifts of every size were necessary to achieve this ambitious goal," says McNair. "Each and every contribution helps to improve the health of our communities."
